
Lifelines Restoration Performance Report Update

Summary of prior Lifelines Council discussions

Presenters: Caltrans; Golden Gate Bridge, Highway, and Transportation District; Water Emergency Transportation Authority

Discussion topics:

- Bridges passable within days, but access may be delayed because of weaker approaches and overpasses.
- Challenge of determining who is allowed back into the city; different credentials, different jurisdictions.
- Debris clearance mutual aid agreements between DPW and Caltrans will likely be needed.



December 13, 2023

Summary of prior Lifelines Council discussions

- > Presenter: Bay Area Rapid Transit
- **Discussion topics**:
 - O BART can be an important resource soon after an earthquake, but has dependencies on electric power, pump stations, and fuel for generators.
 - Movement of responders, inspectors, DSWs will be critical for the recovery of multiple lifeline providers.
 - Fuel will be in demand by all transportation modes there will be regional prioritization with state oversight post-earthquake.
 - Port piers are critical to connect people to ferries in the hours/days before bridge approaches are passable.

- SFDEM hosts an annual San Francisco Fleet Week (SFFW) Defense Support of Civil Authorities (DSCA) Exercise Program with the San Francisco Fleet Week Association to bring together local, Bay Area, state, federal, and Department of Defense (DoD) partners to improve emergency response and foster relationships.
- Scenario: Catastrophic earthquake
 - Debris, infrastructure destruction, utility failures
 - Disruptions to transportation systems
 - ~57% of City and County of San Francisco staff reside outside of City limits









Scope:


 Facilitated discussion about local plans and emergency response activities related to route reopening and the transportation of emergency services personnel after a major disaster into SF.

- Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and Department Operations Centers (DOCs) coordination



Overall Exercise Program Takeaways





- Successful series of exercises with strong participation and buy-in. One of the largest exercises in SFDEM's history.
- External assistance and coordination needs
- Regional considerations and resource prioritization
- Fuel may be a limiting factor for response operations (ground and maritime)



First Responder / Disaster Service Worker (DSW) Transportation





- Tested actual movement of first responders/DSWs via ferries and buses
- Staffing and needs for Muster Sites and Collection Points
- Considerations for tracking staff movement
- Access to first responder/DSW transportation
- Timeline for initiating emergency transportation



Emergency Route Reopening





- Route reopening coordination needs
- Route reopening/recovery vs. debris management
- Policy decisions around route reopening prioritization



Interoperable Communications





- Built on successes from last year's SFFW Communications Drill
- Validated interoperability between military radios and SF's radio system.
 Protocols have been implemented nationally.
- Successfully tested alternate communication methods, such as amateur radio and SHARES HF
- Data system connections between the military and SF public safety agencies




Next Steps

Operation Epicenter

A San Francisco-led, regional, full-scale earthquake exercise.

High Priority



USGS models have consistently shown a **high likelihood** of a major (6.7M+) earthquake in the near future



HAZUS modeling for San Francisco needs to be updated with fresh data



A significant earthquake will require coordinated regional response and recovery efforts

Hazus Modeling

 Completed by Dec. 2025

Funding Scoping

 Completed by Dec. 2026

Full-Scale Exercise

 Completed in 2027 or 2028

Hazus Modeling

- FEMA's nationally standardized risk modeling methodology
- GIS-based desktop software fed by local, state, and federal data
- Quantifies and maps risk information from natural hazards:
 - Physical Damage
 - Economic Loss
 - Social Impacts
 - Cost-effectiveness
- Supports data-driven decision-making
- Can be used in real-time disaster response

Hazus Modeling

Existing Model

- Completed in 2017
- Based on:
 - 2001 California Geological Survey information
 - 2010 Census Data
 - 2013 SF Data ground shaking and liquefaction maps

Updated Model

- Completed by a consultant
- Update to include 2020 census data
- Incorporate updated liquefaction and landslide data
- Incorporate infrastructure and building code improvements
- Findings will be outlined in a report for technical and nontechnical audiences

Exercise Funding Scoping



Conducted by a consultant



An initial assessment of planning and project management costs, local jurisdiction costs, and potential funding sources



Will provide findings in a report

Regional Full-Scale Exercise

- In the very beginning stages
- Test interdependencies
- Focus on FEMA's Community Lifelines
- Simulate resource sharing and coordination
- Test assumptions and identify gaps
- Leverage the opportunity to coordinate with state and federal response entities (bridge inspections, building inspections, road reopening, etc.).
